1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is single faculty college that is Arts with the B A program with five departments in the subject of Marathi, Hindi, English, Geography and History. The college has a number of representations to the University in the form of Members, Academic Council, Board of Studies, Chairman/Members Syllabus Committee and Sub-Committee, who contribute in the Design and Development of the University Curriculum. Faculty members also represent the University as Members in University Chairman/Members of Research and Recognition Committee, Chairman/Members of Department of Research Committee, Members of Board of University Teachers Recognition and as subject Experts. They play an important role in designing and updating the curriculum directly and through interactions/suggestions from various quarters. Regular feedback is obtained from students and teachers. These suggestions are in turn utilized at the time of syllabus framing and restructuring. Faculty offers their services as resource persons at syllabus based workshops. Faculty members participate in syllabus based workshops. Books by our faculty prescribed as Text and Reference books by the University. Memorandums of understanding and collaborative activities with various institutions give our students the much needed impetus and exposure. Academic program, institutional goals and objectives are integrated.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college is situated in the rural area, so we cater to the needs of the students who come from the economically poor section of the society and reserved category. Regarding admission process the college follows rules and regulations of Solapur University, Solapur. Introduction of semester and CBCS pattern allows for continuous evaluation of students. Internal evaluation methods involve class tests, home assignments, tutorials, oral exams, group discussion, etc. Use of ICT enabled teaching-learning process through e-resources and power point presentations enrich teaching learning experience. Effective delivery of course curriculum is ensured through field visits, industrial visits, and skill development programs, special counseling, expert lectures. Strategies are adopted to increase and improve access for economically weaker, differentially able students. For slow learners and advanced learners the college offers remedial courses, counseling, mentoring scheme. Planning and organizing teaching, learning and evaluation schedules. The college implements interactive, collaborative and independent learning and makes it more student-centric. The college has a provision of *Examination Grievance Redressal Committee* which attempts to observe transparency regarding the grievance. The committee facilitates the seating arrangement, hall tickets distribution and other issues associated to examination

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college promotes and monitors progress of research work. Three faculties applied for minor research projects. University sanctioned Research Center in two subjects. Two faculty members have been recognized as research guides by Solapur University, Solapur. Two faculty members have successfully completed doctoral degree and two faculty members have submitted their Ph. D. thesis while four faculty members have registered their Ph. D. admission in various UGC recognized Universities and research centers. Substantial research

publication in various peer reviewed journals ensures development in research activities. Books with ISBN numbers are published by the faculty members and chapters in book have also been contributed by the faculty. MoU with organizations/associations, NSS, *Anti-Sexual Harassment Committee*, *Anti-Ragging Committee*, *Vivek Vahini* address issues such as gender sensitizing, water conservation, save girl child, cleanliness drive, tree plantation and preservation, health related problems, etc. Staff members serve as resource persons at academic and social events. One faculty member has received University Level research award in *Avishkar Research Festival* and represented Solapur University in State Level Research Festival. Our students have participated at the University level Research Festival. Two national level seminars have been organized by the college.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Adequate infrastructure is provided for teaching, learning, sports, cultural and extension activities. The college has spacious classrooms. The college library has more than 8000 books, 41 journals and periodicals, encyclopedias, and dictionaries. Wi-Fi connectivity is available for faculty and students. The college has INFLIBENT and N-List, OPAC, book bank facility and Inter library loan services. Library conducts book exhibition and book review every year. The college has MoU with different libraries. For the health services the college has MoU with local hospital. The college provides safe drinking water. The faculty members and the students use computers and laptops as learning resources.

Student Support and Progression

The college ensures student support and progression. Regarding the scholarships and free ships the students apply for state and central Government Scholarships. In the last five years 856 students were benefited from it. The college has a special fund for poor students. Every year poor students are financially supported to pay the exam form fees. In the last five years 51 students applied for it and got benefited from the same. The students are supported in competitive examinations, career counseling, soft skill development, remedial coaching, yoga and meditation and personal counseling. The institution has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances including sexual harassment and ragging cases. The student council in the college is active. As per the university norms, the students are given representation on different academic and administrative bodies. There is alumni association in the college. The students actively participate in sports, cultural activities, NSS, NCC and other co curricular activities.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college tries to develop the multi-dimensional personality of the students. It drafts perspective plans at the beginning of the academic year. Taking into account the vision and mission of the college, the college prepares perspective plans. The governance of the institution is reflective of an effective leadership in tune with the vision and mission of the college. There are statutory and non statutory bodies with representations from teaching and non teaching staff as per the government norms. The management of the college is decentralized. The existence of statutory and non statutory bodies with representation from teaching nonteaching members and students highlights decentralization of the work and the participative management. The college implements e governance in administration, finance and Accounts, student admission and support and examination. The college has various bodies which are effective in governance and management. To evaluate the annual performance of the teaching and non teaching staff, there is a provision of self assessment report as per the

statute. The report consists of workload, duties assigned, qualification improvement, contribution in college activities, research and publications, participation in faculty development program, relations with students and staff and personal aspects. Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly. IQAC has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance. IQAC constantly focuses on research and the increasing number of PH. D. holders, participation in conferences, seminars and workshops, and publication of research papers is the impact of the focus. The institution reviews the teaching learning process and learning outcomes through IQAC.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The College offers the Gender Equity Awareness program. The program includes the arrangements of experts' lectures on gender equity, essay writing competition and elocution competitions on the same subject. The college has rain harvesting structures and utilization in the campus. As far as the green practices are concern, the institution attempts to observe a bicycle day in academic year. The students are motivated to use public transport.

The college attempts to be distinctive in gender equity activities. Taking in to account the need of gender equality, the college has tried to focus on the Trans - gender community. The trans gender community of Vairag where the college is situated has remained as a neglected aspect of the society. The college attempts to give them respect and space as the other genders by Calling them to the college and providing a stage so that they can voice their emotions.

The college has two best practices. One is *Jagar Janivancha* (Awareness of perceptions about women in society) for empowerment of women and gender equity. The second is *Blood Donation Movement* which ensures sufficient collection of safe and adequate blood and creates awareness regarding blood donation.

Response:

The institution attempts to integrate cross cutting issues related to environment which has become a challenging issue all over the world. The issues are focused through survey and project. The project *Live Stock - A case study of Dhorale Village in Barshi Tahshil* attempts a survey of 40 families for the study. It covers types of live stock and its importance, food of live stock, awareness of their health and cleanness, relation of live stock and Environment. The second project *Environmental study of slum population in Vairag* attempts to raise the problems related to drinking water, health, diet, cleanness of slum population. Another project on *Co-relation of Agriculture and Environment: A case study of Irlewadi Village in Barshi Tahshil* covers the use of technology in agriculture, use chemical fertilizers, hybrid seeds, insecticides, irrigation etc. The project on *Environmental study of Brick Factories- A case study of Vairag Village Tal Barshi* covers problems of brick workers, raw materil nd process, brick production, effect on environment etc, The project on *Awarness of Environment within the people – A Study of Tulshidasnagar in Vairag* raises the effect of sugar factory on the environment . These issues are addressed through the survey conducted by the students. On the basis of the survey a report is prepared and discussed with the students.

The college attempts to assess learning levels of the students after the admission. The departments conduct a unit test in each semester before the semester ending exams of the university. The institution plans to assess the learning levels of the students of B A first year after the admission through the test. Taking into account the slow learners in each subject, a remedial course in the concerned subject is introduced. The special lectures throughout the academic year are arranged for them. The topics which are beyond the comprehension of the students are focused in the lectures. Homework is also suggested for the practice.

Through the same unit test advanced learners are also marked taking into account their performance. Extra lectures are conducted throughout the academic year for the benefit of the students. There is a provision of books in the library for the slow and advance learners.

The college ensures that the students participate in different extension activities in the neighborhood community to sensitize students on social issues. The teachers of the college give lectures in neighborhood community focusing different social issues such as degradation of values in life, issues related to women,

Beti Bacchav Beti Padahv Movement, awareness of voting, water management, environmental issues etc. The students also are motivated to participate in the activities. The street plays are arranged to address the issue of sex determination in order to make people aware about the sex ratio and its effects on society.
